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in fictions of consent urvashi chakravarty excavates the ideologies of slavery that took root in early modern england in the period that preceded the development of an organized trade in enslaved persons despite the persistent fiction that england was innocent of racialized slavery chakravarty argues that we must hold early modern england and its narratives of exceptional and essential freedom to account for the frameworks of slavery that it paradoxically but strategically engendered slavery was not a foreign or faraway phenomenon she demonstrates rather the ideologies of slavery were seeded in the quotidian spaces of english life and in the everyday contexts of england s service society from the family to the household in the theater and especially the grammar school classroom where the legacies of classical slavery and race were inherited and negotiated the english conscripted the roman freedman s figurative stain of slavery to register an immutable sign of bondage and to secure slavery to epidermal difference even as early modern frameworks of volitional service provided the strategies for later fictions of happy slavery in the atlantic world early modern texts presage the heritability of slavery in early america reveal the embeddedness of slavery within the family and illuminate the ways in which bloodlines of descent underwrite the racialized futures of enslavement fictions of consent intervenes in a number of areas including early modern literary and cultural studies premodern critical race studies the reception of classical antiquity and the histories of law education and labor to uncover the conceptual genealogies of slavery and servitude and to reveal the everyday sites where the

foundations of racialized slavery were laid although early modern england claimed to have too pure an air for slaves to breathe in chakravarty reveals slavery was a quintessentially english phenomenon

slavery and sexuality in the ancient world are well researched on their own yet rarely have they been examined together chapters address a wealth of art literature and drama to explore a wide range of issues including gendered power dynamics sexual violence in slave revolts same sex relations between free and enslaved people and the agency of assault victims

in his book on social closure jürgen mackert seeks to reinvigorate the idea of social closure and bring it back as a basic sociological concept for understanding the strategies and processes powerful groups use to improve their life chances at the expense of the less powerful to do this he puts forward a mechanism based explanatory approach that makes it possible to empirically study social closure through exclusion in the context of neoliberalism exploitation within global capitalism and elimination in the ongoing legacy of settler colonialism further he identifies two critical social mechanisms to explain how human beings are denied access to resources rights or critical networks and to bring power dynamics into closure analysis

since the beginning of commodity culture products have been marketed with images reflecting racist concepts of otherness using the prominent examples of three companies uncle ben s sarotti and banania this book examines how racist trademark figures were established in the u s germany and france and built on nation specific processes of racial stereotyping while it finds that the three figures mirror their national histories of slavery orientalism and colonialism the book reveals that their paths through popular culture also followed strikingly similar patterns conceived in an era of overt racism each symbol was challenged by social movements over the course of the 20th century and became increasingly marginalized in promotional activities in the early 2000s however all three figures were relaunched with supposedly new makeovers hitting once again at the heart of commodity culture and illustrating the subtle prevalence of racist stereotypes series racism analysis series a studies vol 3

this book examines slavery an antiquated ugly inhumane practice seemingly abolished in the nineteenth century yet never eradicated the legacies of historical slavery have become increasingly subject to public debate manifested in calls for reparations the unesco slave route project and in the dismantling of confederate monuments in the united states ngos have researched and publicized the extent of contemporary slavery which some of the essays in this collection discuss this area of inquiry intersects with wider debates about the legacies of colonialism and structural racism which could be seen in the rhodes must fall campaigns in south africa and oxford ngos estimate that there are between 21 and 46 million slaves worldwide today the essays gathered here critically examine the historical roots of slavery the issue of reparations and deconstruct contemporary human trafficking

in the afterlife of reproductive slavery alys eve weinbaum investigates the continuing resonances of atlantic slavery in the cultures and politics of human reproduction that characterize contemporary biocapitalism as a form of racial capitalism that relies on the commodification of the human reproductive body biocapitalism is dependent upon what weinbaum calls the slave episteme the racial logic that drove four centuries of slave breeding in the americas and caribbean weinbaum outlines how the slave episteme shapes the practice of reproduction today especially through use of biotechnology and surrogacy engaging with a broad set of texts from toni morrison s beloved and octavia butler s dystopian speculative fiction to black marxism histories of slavery and legal cases involving surrogacy weinbaum shows how black feminist contributions from the 1970s 1980s and 1990s constitute a powerful philosophy of history one that provides the means through which to understand how reproductive slavery haunts the present

roman comedy evolved early in the war torn 200s bce troupes of lower class and slave actors traveled through a militarized landscape full of displaced persons and the newly enslaved together the actors made comedy to address mixed class hybrid multilingual audiences surveying the whole of the plautine corpus where slaves are central figures and the extant fragments of early comedy this book is grounded in the history of slavery and integrates theories of resistant speech humor and performance part i shows how actors joked about what people feared natal alienation beatings sexual abuse hard labor hunger poverty and how street theater forms confronted debt violence and war loss part ii catalogues the onstage expression of what people desired revenge honor free will legal personhood family marriage sex food free speech a way home through memory and manumission or escape all complicated by the actors maleness comedy starts with anger

this book investigates the legal evolution of the free soil principle in england france and the low countries during the early modern period ca 1500 1800 which essentially stated that as soon as slaves entered a certain country they would immediately gain their freedom this book synthesizes the existing literature on the origins and evolution of the principle adds new insights by drawing on previously undiscussed primary sources on the development of free soil in the low countries and employs a pan western european and comparative approach to identify and explain the differences and similarities in the application of this principle in france england and the low countries divided into four sections the book begins with a brief introduction to the subject matter putting it in its historical context slavery is legally defined using the established international law definition and both the status of slavery in europe before the early modern period and the atlantic slave trade are discussed secondly the book assesses the legal origins of the free soil principle in england france and the low countries during the period 1500 1650 and discusses the legal repercussions of slaves coming to england france and the low countries from other countries where the institution was legally recognized thirdly it addresses the further development of the free soil principle during the period 1650 1800 in the fourth and last section the book uses the insights gained to provide a pan western european and comparative perspective on the origins and application of the free soil principle in western europe in this regard it compares the origins of free soil for the respective countries discussed as well as its application during the heyday of the atlantic slave trade this perspective makes it possible to explain some of the divergences in approaches between the countries examined and represents the first ever full scale country comparison on this subject in a book
